

Visitor Satisfaction Survey



**Swan Canning Riverpark
December 2023 Report**

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Executive Summary

This report has been prepared for the Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, and reports the results of a visitor survey carried out mostly at the parks and reserves around/bordering the Swan and Canning Riverpark to measure the level of visitor satisfaction. This is a requirement for the departmental 2023-24 Budget Statements as an Outcome and Key Effectiveness Indicator, with a target of 85% average satisfaction.

The survey was completed in December 2023 and is referred to in this report as the 2023 survey to distinguish it from surveys completed in previous years.

The 2023 survey was undertaken by Xyst Limited and uses the Yardstick user survey platform. This allows direct comparison with other organisations in Australia, New Zealand and Canada. The survey can be repeated regularly to allow trend analysis. The 2023 survey was started on 10 December 2023 and completed on 24 December 2024. School holidays started on 16 December 2023, about halfway through the survey period. By comparison;

- The 2017 survey was completed entirely during spring school holidays in September/October 2017
- The 2018 survey was completed in December 2018 with summer school holidays commencing about halfway through the survey period.
- The 2019 survey was completed in December 2019, just prior to the start of the summer school holidays.
- The 2020 survey was completed in April/May 2021 during the school term. This change was due to Covid restrictions.
- The 2021 survey was completed in December 2021 with summer school holidays commencing about halfway through the survey period.
- The 2022 survey was completed in late December 2022 after school holidays commenced.

The survey collected information from 306 respondents about patterns of use, activities, expectations, satisfaction and demographics. This is an increase of 56 surveys over the 2022 survey. The questions asked during the 2023 survey are largely the same as those asked in 2022.

The purpose of the survey is to identify:

- Expectations of visitors to the Swan Canning Riverpark;
- Levels of satisfaction with features of the Swan Canning Riverpark;
- Patterns of recreational use;
- Issues and areas for improvement.

Key Findings

- Average satisfaction is 85.4% or 5.98 on a scale of 1 to 7. This is slightly above the target level of 85% and higher than previous years.
- Overall satisfaction with the Riverpark and its facilities is 99.7%, well above the 2023 median of 97.3% and the highest of the twelve comparative surveys in 2023.
- Average satisfaction targets were met at 16 out of 25 parks, up from 6 in 2022.

- Gardens/trees/landscape features, followed by cleanliness, grass maintenance and shade are the four most important features of the Riverpark in the locations that were surveyed. These features are commonly in the top six.
- Importance scores were higher overall in 2023 than in 2022.
- Satisfaction in 2023 was highest with security, gardens/trees/landscape features, and river water quality, and lowest with interpretive signage, toilets, and playgrounds.
- In general, satisfaction is higher in 2023 than in 2022.
- The size of the service gaps for most features are slightly larger than 2022, but none are significant.
- Beach and water based activities are more common in 2023 due to researchers targeting these park users. Most common water based activities in 2023 are swimming, canoeing/kayaking and fishing.
- Only 30% of respondents indicate that they live locally to the site where they were surveyed, with 45% of those living within 10 minutes walking time. This compares with 47% and 59% respectively in 2022.
- A further 65% of respondents come from the wider Perth region, and 5% international visitors. The number of visitors from the wider Perth region has increased slightly over the last three survey periods and international visitors are starting to make a comeback.
- Most (68%) of respondents use a private vehicle to get to the Riverpark, with 25% of respondents walking. Walking is significantly lower than in 2022, possibly due to the increased proportion of respondents being water users and needing to bring equipment.
- 8% of respondents in 2023 travelled less than 5 minutes to get to the Riverpark. This is less than 2022 and 2021 and similar to the 9% reported in 2020. Travel time is logically related to the amount of local use which is lower in 2023 than previous years.
- 54% of respondents visit the site they were surveyed at once a week or more often. This is similar to the 57% reported in 2022 and lower than the 71% and 63% reported in 2019 and 2020 respectively.
- 74% of respondents were planning to stay for more than an hour in 2023 compared with 55% in 2022. The planned duration of stay may be related to the sample targeting water users, and the decreased numbers of local users.

Conclusions

- The **average satisfaction** of 85.4% meets the target level of 85% average satisfaction in 2023 which is an improvement on previous years.
- The ranking of importance and satisfaction within the thirteen scored features is fairly consistent from year to year.
- The majority of Riverpark visitors are from the local area or the wider Perth region. The balance between the two varies from year to year with 2020 to 2023 and 2018 having less local use (30% to 51%) than in 2019 and 2017 (67% to 68%).
- Provision and quality of some features are perceived to be inadequate at some locations (see pages 16 to 17 for details) but gaps have generally decreased since 2022. However, the small individual sample sizes (12 at each park) makes these results less reliable.
- Shade was the most commonly identified issue but grass maintenance had the biggest individual service gaps.
- School holidays don't appear to have a measurable impact on results with variations between years not appearing to be correlated to whether the survey was undertaken during school holidays or not.
- There appears to be no consistent correlation between average satisfaction and weather or local use.

1.0 Methodology

1.1 Project Background

Yardstick Parks User Survey is a survey of park visitors that is carried out annually or as required to meet specific demands for user consultation. The survey is designed to record visitor expectations, satisfaction and behavior.

Visitor expectations of levels of service are measured by asking them to rate the importance of various park features. These results are compared with visitor satisfaction for the same features. Measuring satisfaction gives an indication of performance as measured against expectations. The difference, or gap between importance and satisfaction gives a measure of under or over performance in delivering the expected level of service.

A total of 306 surveys were undertaken in December 2023 from 25 different foreshore park and reserve locations along the Swan Canning Riverpark. This year there was a strong focus to capture those entering and exiting the water. The Riverpark is not managed by a single authority, so the 25 sites represent river foreshore parks managed by different local and other authorities. The survey repeats the Yardstick surveys undertaken annually from 2017 to 2022. The survey size was increased to 300 surveys for 2023 with a total of 306 collected.

1.2 Questions

The core questions are designed to collect information about the typical core parks facilities and services, and to ensure that the survey can be completed in a typical timeframe of 5 to 8 minutes. Questions are reviewed annually to ensure relevance and to meet current parks management needs.

Questions have been added for the Swan Canning Riverpark survey with input from DBCA staff to ensure that the survey meets specific needs. A full set of questions is provided as Appendix 1.

In 2021, a seven point Likert scale was introduced to replace the satisfaction scale previously used for overall satisfaction. In 2023 the wording used for this question was “**Overall, how satisfied were you with your visit to this park on a scale of 1 to 7, with 1 being the least satisfied and 7 being the most satisfied**”.

Other importance and satisfaction responses are scored using the following scoring system:

“Don’t know” or blank responses are given a score of 3 for importance (neutral) and are not included when calculating satisfaction. This ensures that these responses do not affect the final results.

1.3 Report features

This report is designed to provide a summary of your specific results for the most recent survey activity, and a comparison with results from previous years.

The full results of the survey are available to members online at www.yardstickglobal.org

The on-line report gives results on a park by park basis, as well as the ability to compare your organisation's results against others participating in the project. It includes filter tools to enable members to custom design report results by selecting park types and organisations.

Overall satisfaction percentage is calculated from the total numbers of respondents that gave a score of five, six or seven (i.e. above the mid-point of four) to the specific question on overall satisfaction with the park in which the survey was conducted. Respondents that scored overall satisfaction with their visit to the park as four or less are excluded as these respondents are considered to be not satisfied. Overall satisfaction is therefore the percentage of satisfied respondents vs not satisfied respondents.

The average (mean) satisfaction is calculated by summing the overall satisfaction scores from all respondents (including those that were not satisfied) and dividing by the total number of responses to give an average score between 1 and 7. This score is converted to a percentage to enable comparison with the target of 85%. Average satisfaction is therefore a score (converted to a percentage) calculated from the scores attributed to each response on the satisfaction scale (see section 1.2).

Average satisfaction typically produces a satisfaction score that is lower than overall satisfaction.

Importance and satisfaction for individual features is calculated from the survey questions for those features.

The service gap between importance and satisfaction is an indication of under or over performance. Anything less than a full one point +/- result in any chart should be read as a relatively minor indication of a level of service that is too great or too poor.

1.4 Survey Confidence and Reliability

A total of 306 surveys were collected (minimum of twelve per park) and the results aggregated for overall and average satisfaction to provide a confidence level of 95% and a margin of error of 5% for the entire survey.

Standard deviation is used as a measure of the degree to which respondents provided similar or dissimilar responses. Standard deviation is calculated from responses to the question on overall satisfaction for the park. Where the standard deviation of respondents' satisfaction ratings are less than one indicates that most respondents gave similar ratings that were very close to the mean (average) score. The lower the standard deviation, the more consistent the results.

2.0 Main Report Comparative Findings

The overall satisfaction of respondents was measured by asking them to rate their overall satisfaction with the park on a scale of least satisfied to most satisfied. From these scores two measures are calculated, mean satisfaction (average) and overall satisfaction.

2.1 Average satisfaction

The average or mean satisfaction of respondents is calculated by adding the total of all scores (from 1 to 7) and dividing by the total number of respondents. This gives an average or mean score for 2023 of 5.98 or 85.4% across all parks. The target level of mean or average satisfaction in the 2023/24 year is 85%.

Chart 1 shows average satisfaction since 2017 with the target satisfaction represented by the dark green line. The target was met in 2017, 2019 and 2023. Average satisfaction has risen and fallen slightly since 2017, and is now 85.4%, just above the target level of 85%.




Chart 1. Average satisfaction trend

2.2 Overall satisfaction

Overall satisfaction is a measure of the percentage of respondents that were above the midpoint of the scale. Chart 2 shows overall satisfaction since 2017 with a trendline in gold showing that overall satisfaction has increased since a low point in 2021 with 305 out of 306 respondents indicating some degree of satisfaction. Only one respondent in 2023 gave a score of 4 (the midpoint of the Likert scale).




Chart 2. Overall satisfaction trend

Chart 3 shows the performance of Swan Canning Riverpark compared with other Australian organisations that undertook Yardstick parks user surveys in the last year. Overall satisfaction of Swan Canning Riverpark respondents was scored at 99.7% which was the highest score of the twelve participating organisations. For comparison purposes, and to demonstrate the relationship between overall satisfaction and average satisfaction, the chart also includes average satisfaction for each organisation alongside overall satisfaction. The score of 85.4% is an improvement on previous years but is still below the median for the other organisations.




Chart 3. Overall Satisfaction - Comparison with other organisations

Chart 4 presents the aggregated data for the whole Riverpark showing the distribution of overall satisfaction scores from 1 to 7. The level of satisfaction is higher than 2022, with only one respondent scoring at the midpoint or below compared with 3 in 2022 and 24 in 2021. No respondents gave a score of one, two or three. The majority of respondents gave a score of 6 and similar numbers scored 5 and 7, resulting in an average of 5.98.




Chart 4. Distribution of overall satisfaction scores

2.3 Satisfaction by park

Chart 5 shows the distribution of overall satisfaction scores for each park. The numbers of responses are shown on each bar.




Chart 5. Distribution of overall satisfaction scores by park

From the scores as indicated in Chart 5, average satisfaction for each park has been calculated and is shown in Chart 6 for both 2023 and 2022. Average satisfaction varies by park, and ranges from 79% at Success Hill and Lilac Hill to 93% at Kent Street Weir and Shelley Beach and Prisoners Point. The lowest average satisfaction in 2022 was 73%. Sixteen of the 25 parks achieved the target of 85% average satisfaction compared with six in 2022.

Results show no particular pattern from 2022 to 2023, with some parks higher and others lower although the majority are higher than in 2022.




Chart 6. Average satisfaction by park

3.0 Key Result areas

3.1 Visitor Expectations

Respondents were asked to rate the importance of a range of parks features on a scale from totally unimportant to very important. This gives a measure of expected level of service for each feature. The standard features that respondents were asked to rate are:

1. Gardens and Trees
2. Children's playgrounds and equipment (under 12 years)
3. Seats and tables
4. Toilets
5. Signage
6. Cleanliness (e.g. lack of litter/lack of graffiti)
7. Grass maintenance
8. Paths, tracks and trails
9. Shade
10. Security (personal safety while in the park)
11. Water quality
12. Natural vegetation
13. Interpretive signage

The mean importance for each feature across all parks is expressed in Chart 7 as a percentage of the maximum possible score. The results for 2022 are included for comparison.




Chart 7. **Relative importance of parks features – all parks**

The most important feature overall in 2023 is gardens/trees/landscape features, followed by cleanliness, grass maintenance and shade. The top eight scoring features all scored very similarly, and were the same as the top eight in 2022. Playgrounds, interpretive signage and toilets scored the lowest importance overall. The bottom five features are the same as in 2022 and 2021.

Results are generally in a similar order to 2022 although scores are between five and thirteen percentage points higher in 2023 than they were in 2022.

3.2 Visitor Experiences

Respondents were asked to rate their satisfaction with the same parks features that they had rated for importance. In this case, the scale used was from very dissatisfied to very satisfied. This gives a measure of user experience in terms of whether or not expectations were met.

The mean satisfaction for each feature across all parks is expressed in Chart 8 as a percentage of the maximum possible score. The results for 2022 are included for comparison.

Satisfaction in 2023 was highest with security, gardens/trees/landscape features, river water quality, cleanliness and paths and track. The top eight features are the same as in 2022 although in a slightly different order. Scores are very consistent so the order is not significant. Interpretive signage, toilets and playgrounds scored the lowest for satisfaction in 2023. Satisfaction with most features has increased by five to ten percentage points since 2022, although satisfaction with interpretive signage has decreased slightly.




Chart 8. Relative satisfaction with parks features – all parks

4.0 Service Gap Analysis

The service gap is calculated by subtracting the importance score from the satisfaction score i.e. experience minus expectations. Where respondents have scored satisfaction lower than importance, this indicates that their experience did not meet their expectations for the feature in the park in which they were surveyed. This is represented by a negative service gap.

On the other hand, if satisfaction scores higher than performance, this results in a positive service gap, indicating a level of over-performance, or a higher level of service being experienced than expected.

Anything less than a full half point (+/-0.5) result in any chart should be read as a relatively minor indication of a level of service that is too great/poor. Anything between +/-0.5 – +/-1.0 should be reviewed and any gap over +/-1.0 requires further examination on why there is a major gap between respondents’ expectations and experience.

4.1 Overall Service Gap

Chart 9 shows the difference between importance and satisfaction for all parks for the features where both importance and satisfaction were measured. The results from 2022 are included for comparison. The gap varies from -0.42 for shade to +0.44 for playgrounds. Service gaps have varied over the last three years as ratings for importance and satisfaction vary, and overall they are not significant. However, when assessed by individual park the service gaps become more significant and can be better targeted for action keeping in mind the sample size of 12 to 16.




Chart 9. Overall service level gap – all parks

4.2 Individual site service gaps

There were a few individual negative service gaps where satisfaction was more than one point less than importance.

The number of service gaps of more than -1.00 has decreased from 2022 results. There are fewer significant service gaps for seats and tables, signs, cleanliness, natural vegetation and interpretive signage than in 2022, and none at all for gardens, trees and landscape features, playgrounds, signs, cleanliness, paths and tracks, security, water quality or natural vegetation. Shade is the most commonly identified issue but grass maintenance has the largest service gaps.

Chart 10 shows results for service gaps at individual sites for all features. Highlighted cells show major gaps in service level (red) and minor gaps in service level (yellow). Cells highlighted in green show features where the level of satisfaction is more than 0.5 points higher than importance, indicating that there is no unmet demand for these features at these locations. It should be noted however, that due to the small sample sizes at each site (12 to 16 surveys), these results should be considered indicative only.

5.0 Activities Undertaken On Park

5.1 Respondent Activities

Swan Canning Riverpark respondents undertook a range of foreshore land and water related activities, as shown in the charts below. Chart 11 represents the percentage of respondents across all parks who indicated each activity in response to the question “what are you planning to do (or what have you done) in the park today?” People were able to identify more than one activity that they undertook at the park during their visit which is why percentages add to more than 100.

Most respondents were doing beach or water based activities, walking a dog, walking or relaxing. Few respondents were watching sport, cycling or running/jogging. Other activities included attending a Christmas party, visiting a nature reserve and camping in a trailer van. Beach and water based activities were more common in 2023 as researchers made a conscious effort to target users of the water and foreshore area.




Chart 11. Park activities

The 55% of respondents that indicated they were involved in beach or water-based activities were asked what beach or water based activities they were doing. Chart 12 shows the results. Percentages in the chart are of the respondents that were doing beach or water-based activities.




Chart 12. Beach and water based activities

Swimming was the most common activity in 2023 ahead of canoeing/kayaking and fishing which were the most common in 2022. Other activities included paddling with or without dogs.

5.2 Children’s Activities - observed

Children under 15 are not surveyed for ethical reasons. For this reason, researchers log the activity of children in the park whenever they complete a survey so that there is information about the activities of children. Chart 13 represents observed children’s activities across all Swan Canning Riverpark foreshore parks and reserves. Children were most commonly observed doing beach or water based activities, playing with other children or using park facilities. No children were present during only 13% of surveys compared with 22% in 2022. Beach activities were more common amongst children in 2023 than 2022 when they accounted for around 42% of activity. This may have been a factor of the weather at the time of the survey.




Chart 13. Observed Children Activities - All park types

6.0 Supplementary Findings

6.1 Demographic Profile

The gender of respondents is shown in Chart 14. 38% of respondents were female, and 62% male. This doesn't reflect the gender distribution of the wider Perth region, but may either be an indication of patterns of river park use or indicate some sampling bias.




Chart 14. Gender of respondents

Respondents' age groups are presented in Chart 15. The dark green bars show the age distribution of the Greater Perth Region population (15+) from population estimates for 2022 based on the 2021 census. The age distribution of the sample population is shown in light green for comparison.

The sample population had significantly fewer respondents aged over 55, and significantly more aged between 35 and 49 compared with the general population of the area, but otherwise the age breakdown of the sample was very similar to that of the general population. The age range of adults and the presence of children during 87% of surveys is consistent with the parks and activities being popular with families.




Chart 15. Age Groups of respondents

6.2 Cultural identity

The cultural identity of respondents is shown in Chart 16. The majority of respondents (79%) identified as Australian. The next largest cohorts were European (5.9%), and British (English, Irish, Scottish or Welsh – 4.9%). Central and East/South-east Asian made up 2.6% each.




Chart 16. Cultural identity

6.3 Home Location

Chart 18 shows that 30% of respondents were local, i.e. live in the immediate neighbourhood of the park that they were interviewed in. A further 65% were from the wider Perth region, with the remaining 5% being international visitors. Local visitor numbers are down in 2023 compared with previous years, and international visitor numbers have increased.




Chart 17. Home Location

6.4 Modes of Transport

As shown in Chart 18, only 25% of respondents walked to the park that they were interviewed in. This is lower than in 2022 when 39% of respondents walked. A further 68% travelled by private motor vehicle compared with 56% in 2022. Public transport and cycles were used by 3% of respondents respectively, similar to 2022. Differences in modes of transport may reflect weather conditions at the time or the nature of the activities respondents were doing. For instance, private vehicle use is likely to be higher amongst users of the river as they will often need to transport equipment.




Chart 18. Modes of Transport to get to park

6.5 Travel time

All respondents were asked how long they had travelled to get to the park. Responses are shown in Chart 19. Around 40% of respondents spent between 5 and 15 minutes travel time to get to the park they were surveyed at, with a further 36% travelling between 15 and 30 minutes. Only 8% of respondents travelled for less than 5 minutes, and 15% for more than 30 minutes. Results are similar to 2022 but with more respondents travelling more than 30 minutes, and fewer less than 5 minutes.




Chart 19. Travel times

6.6 Walking times

In addition to the question on travel time, respondents that indicated they lived locally were asked how long it would take to walk home from the park where they were interviewed. Of 92 local respondents, around 46% live within 10 minutes' walk of where they were surveyed, with a further 24% of respondents living more than 20 minutes' walk away. This is quite different to 2022 when 59% of local respondents lived within 10 minutes' walk of the park. Results are shown in Chart 20.




Chart 20. **Walking times – all local respondents**

As shown in Chart 21, the 64 respondents that actually walked to the park where they were interviewed (see chart 18 for modes of transport) gave a different result with the biggest changes being at the upper and lower ends of the range. The percentage of respondents that lived within 10 minutes increased from 46% to 63% and the respondents living more than 20 minutes away decreased from 24% to 9%. These results are similar to 2022.




Chart 21. **Walking times – Local respondents that walked**

6.7 Visitor Frequency

Overall, around 54% of respondents visited the park at least once a week and around 76% visited at least once a month. Results are similar to 2022.




Chart 22. Visitor Frequency

6.8 Visit Duration

Chart 23 shows the duration of respondents' visits to the park that they were interviewed in. Visitors were most likely to spend between one and two hours at the park. Only 26% of respondents stayed less than an hour and 23% planned spend two to four hours visiting the park. The duration of visit was generally slightly longer than in 2022 and previous years.




Chart 23. Duration of Visit

8.0 Respondent Feedback

Visitors to the Swan Canning Riverpark parks were asked what change they would suggest to the park they were visiting. In some cases respondents did not have a suggestion. They were also asked what they enjoyed most about their visit. Full results are given in Appendix Two along with demographic data and overall satisfaction. Zeros indicate no response.

8.1 Enjoyment

In general, the most common themes for enjoyment of the Riverpark were:

- **Water Activities:** Fishing, kayaking, paddleboarding, swimming, jet skiing, kite surfing, and boating are mentioned frequently, indicating a strong association with water-based recreational activities.
- **Family Time:** Many entries involve spending time with family, having family picnics, barbecues, and family get-togethers.
- **Nature Appreciation:** References to natural spaces, trees, scenic views, and wildlife highlight a theme of appreciating and enjoying nature.
- **Dog Walking:** Walking dogs in the park and along the riverfront is a recurring activity.
- **Picnics and BBQs:** Many entries mention picnics, barbecues, and eating lunch in the park, emphasizing the social and recreational aspect.
- **Exercise and Outdoor Activities:** Activities like running, biking, playing cricket, and participating in parkrun indicate a focus on outdoor exercise.
- **Socializing with Friends:** Meeting friends, having coffee, and social events like Christmas parties are mentioned, indicating the park as a social hub.
- **Scenic Views:** References to city skyline views, sunsets, and beautiful landscapes highlight the importance of the visual appeal of the surroundings.
- **Recreation Facilities:** Mention of playgrounds, bike paths, basketball courts, and other facilities suggest the availability of diverse recreational options.
- **Event Specifics:** Specific events like birthdays, Christmas celebrations, baby showers, and Rottnest ferry trips are mentioned, indicating that the park serves as a venue for various events and celebrations.

8.2 Suggested improvements

Based on the feedback provided, a summary is provided of the most enjoyed aspects of each park and suggested improvements:

Banks Reserve:

- **Most Enjoyed:** Access to the water.
- **Suggested Improvement:** More seating at riverfront under trees, improved signage, more indigenous recognition, better grass maintenance, and improved fish health.

Belmont Water Ski Area:

- **Most Enjoyed:** River activities and helpful community.

- Suggested Improvement: More car parking, additional shade for hot days, more seating, and a playground for small kids.

Bicton Baths and Blackwall Reach:

- Most Enjoyed: Beautiful big trees and views of the Swan River.
- Suggested Improvement: Shade over the BBQ, opening up the whole Bicton Baths, additional playground equipment, and a freshwater shower or wash-off area.

Burswood Park:

- Most Enjoyed: Walking and great facilities.
- Suggested Improvement: Better transport systems, walking trails, river park management, and revegetation, more information about the water, and additional shading and places for events.

Claisebrook Cove:

- Most Enjoyed: Scenery and nice waterfront.
- Suggested Improvement: Eliminate antisocial behaviour, add more parking, more natural elements along the concrete walkway, and more trees and seats.

Deep Water Point:

- Most Enjoyed: Jet skiing and using the river.
- Suggested Improvement: More parking, more seating and shaded areas, additional boat parking, improved shade, and car parking for boats.

Fish Market Reserve:

- Most Enjoyed: Natural spaces and the river.
- Suggested Improvement: Shade for kids over the playground, better grass maintenance, improved shade for car parks and riverside, and additional facilities like toilets.

Garvey Park:

- Most Enjoyed: Great kayaking facilities.
- Suggested Improvement: Wider footpaths, more fish, better awareness for kayakers and swimmers, and additional facilities for kayaking.

JH Abrahams Reserve:

- Most Enjoyed: Indigenous recognition and open spaces.
- Suggested Improvement: More old trees, additional lights, updated playground, and more seating closer to the water.

Jon Tonkin Reserve, Preston Point, East Fremantle:

- Most Enjoyed: Easy access and well-maintained park.

- Suggested Improvement: Watch out for cyclists signs, more benches closer to the beach, better playground and sand, and improved grass near the river.

Keanes Point The Esplanade:

- Most Enjoyed: Watching kids have fun in the water.
- Suggested Improvement: More shade, benches, trees, and better toilets and public facilities.

Kent Street Weir:

- Most Enjoyed: Good park for water sports.
- Suggested Improvement: Bike repair station, shade, and lights at the BMX track, more information about usage, and dog bags.

Lilac Hill:

- Most Enjoyed: Playing cricket and watching the game.
- Suggested Improvement: More seating and shaded locations, better shade around the cricket oval, and shelters on the water.

Matilda Bay Reserve:

- Most Enjoyed: Views of the city and river.
- Suggested Improvement: More car parking, cleaner grass, better toilet conditions, and cleaner pathways.

Maylands Foreshore:

- Most Enjoyed: Taking the boat out.
- Suggested Improvement: More footpaths closer to the river, more shade over playgrounds, and responsible dog ownership.

Mill Point Reserve and Point Belches:

- Most Enjoyed: Watersports and the well-maintained space.
- Suggested Improvement: More space near the boat ramp, more bins, showers near the ramp, and more seating near the ramp.

Perth Foreshore Barrack Square:

- Most Enjoyed: Destination spot and beautiful views.
- Suggested Improvement: More seating, community-based events, and cheaper places to eat.

Point Fraser and Heirisson Island:

- Most Enjoyed: Riverfront and nature reserve.
- Suggested Improvement: Complete the new bridge, better playground, more Indigenous recognition, and riverfront maintenance.

Point Walter:

- Most Enjoyed: Kitesurfing and family outings.
- Suggested Improvement: More BBQs, community noticeboard for kitesurfing, more seating, and handrails on steep sections.

Sandy Beach Reserve:

- Most Enjoyed: Dog walking and family events.
- Suggested Improvement: Less logs in the water, more car parking, shade over tables, and additional toilets.

Shelley Beach and Prisoners Point:

- Most Enjoyed: Lovely open space and family time.
- Suggested Improvement: More shade, larger trees, more picnic tables, and better BBQ areas.

Sir James Mitchell Park:

- Most Enjoyed: Kayaking on the river.
- Suggested Improvement: Better car parking, more drink fountains, and improved disability access to the water.

Success Hill:

- Most Enjoyed: Swimming and relaxing.
- Suggested Improvement: Fixing the boat landing/jetty, better facilities, more shade, and additional BBQs.

Troy and Tompkins Park:

- Most Enjoyed: Kitesurfing and family time.
- Suggested Improvement: More grassed space, larger launching location, more public toilets, and better shade.

Woodbridge Reserve:

- Most Enjoyed: Great time on the Swan River.
- Suggested Improvement: More car parking, wash-off area, more seats, and another jetty/lookout.

These suggestions reflect the community's desires for more amenities, improved facilities, and better maintenance to enhance their park experiences.

8.3 Condition of river foreshore

The five most common themes from the feedback on the condition of the river foreshore are as follows:

1. Scenic and Natural Beauty:

"Scenic," "good views," "natural," "beautiful," and references to wildlife and vegetation indicate a strong emphasis on the natural and scenic qualities of the riverfront.

2. Riverfront Condition and Maintenance:

Frequent mentions of the condition being "well maintained," "clean," "healthy," and in "good quality" suggest a focus on the overall maintenance and upkeep of the riverfront.

3. Recreation and Use:

Phrases like "well used," "great foreshore walk," "lots of usage," "very busy," and "gets used very well" highlight the recreational value and popularity of the riverfront for various activities.

4. Water Quality and Activities:

Descriptions such as "clear and healthy water," "crystal clear," and references to swimming, kayaking, and boating indicate an interest in water quality and a variety of water-based activities.

5. Suggestions for Improvement:

Comments like "more planting could be put in," "more trees would be nice," and "minor revegetation would be good" suggest an awareness of potential improvements and suggestions for enhancing the riverfront environment.

These themes collectively reflect a positive perception of the riverfront as a well-maintained, scenic, and popular space for recreational and natural activities, with occasional suggestions for further enhancement.
